"Some people tend to think of me as slow and incapable", says Trudy.

"The best part about writing a poem is to see people's reaction after they've read it — especially if it's about them.

"For example, I've had a few men

Trudy says she was "surprised" and "shocked" when local Twyford identity Wendy Evans decided to put on an auction and fashion show to help raise the \$4000 needed to get the book published.

At the event, models of all ages, shapes and sizes strutted their stuff wearing clothes hought from op-
